Mental Health in Emergency Departments resource impact for First Responders	Link to 22 May 2018 Edmonton Journal article, For Edmonton police, mental health calls mean countless hours sitting in hospital waiting rooms, provided by Terry O'Riordan reviewed for discussion. Much work reported in Calgary Zone by the "Form 10 Committee", inclusive of representatives from Calgary Police Services as well as community partners. Group is seeking to reduce the number of Form 10s in community by identifying alternative courses of action to address mental health crises, thereby reducing the amount of Police time to transfer custody of Form 10 patients to AHS Emergency Department. Goal of 90% of clients out of care of police within 90 minutes. Challenging issue with great variance in response between urban and rural geographies and availability of on-site security to receive custody.
