The Kidney Health Strategic Network partners on and supports a number of Provincial projects and initiatives.

<u>Starting dialysis on Time At home on the Right Therapy</u> (START)

In partnership with the Kidney Health SCN and Alberta Kidney Care, the Northern and Southern Alberta Renal Programs are participating in the START project. The START project aims to address the increasing demand for dialysis through the following goals:

- maximizing the safe and effective use of peritoneal dialysis
- ensuring patients are starting dialysis at the appropriate time
- improving patient outcomes and experiences
- reducing costs to the healthcare system

Results from the START Project

Baseline data for the period October 1, 2016 to December 31, 2016, show:


- (1) The number of patients starting dialysis in hospital has been higher in Calgary (60%) than in Edmonton (28%)
- (2) The average kidney function ("eGFR") of patients starting dialysis electively as outpatients was 8.2 ml/min/1.73m²
- (3) Nearly all patients who were eligible for peritoneal dialysis were offered the therapy and overall, 55% of eligible patients selected peritoneal dialysis, provincially.
- (4) There is wide variation in the rate of patients choosing peritoneal dialysis. Patients selecting peritoneal dialysis range from 40% to 67% across Alberta.
- (5) Eighty-six percent of patients who chose peritoneal dialysis received a peritoneal dialysis catheter within six months of starting dialysis.

During the first three months of the START Project, 30% of new patients who started dialysis in Alberta received peritoneal dialysis as their first treatment, and 34% received peritoneal dialysis within six months of starting therapy. Since the introduction of the START Project, there has been a nine percent increase in the number of new patients receiving peritoneal dialysis within six months of initiating dialysis when compared to historical data.

Next Steps

At the 6-month and 12-month marks, the project team will provide more detailed information about the processes that drive important patient and program outcomes. These detailed reports will be used to inform Innovation Collaborative Learning Sessions to be held in June 2017, November 2017 and March 2018. During these learning sessions, front-line staff and other key stakeholders will build on the detailed information about processes driving important patient and program outcomes, and develop, implement and monitor strategies for maximizing the safe and effective use of peritoneal dialysis, ensuring patients are starting dialysis at the appropriate time.

Celebrating Outstanding Achievements


In April 2017, the **digital storytelling team**, in conjunction with the **Patient Engagement Team**, was named one of five finalists for the President's Award for Patient and Family Centred Care. One of our Kidney Health Advisors, Bob Stallworthy, is a member of this group. Bob's story, <u>Caught by Surprise</u>, was one of seven digital stories written and produced in the summer of 2016.

These stories have been shared across Alberta Health Services in many different meetings, conferences and presentations. It has been a very valuable activity with a specific impact that the patient and family advisors can see. Congratulations to Bob and the entire digital storytelling team!

The **Modality Education team** has also been recognized as one of the five finalists for the <u>President's</u> <u>Excellence Quality Improvement Award</u>. The goal of the modality education project was to develop, implement and evaluate provincial education that gives patients the information, skills and support in making decisions regarding dialysis options. Education champions from the Northern Alberta Renal Program (NARP) and the Southern Alberta Renal Program (SARP) worked together along with patients and families to produce a provincially consistent approach to introductory modality education. This approach includes an education pathway, content development, a video, and an evaluation plan. The content and video detail the different types of dialysis and their potential advantages and challenges, including patient testimonials that describe the impact of the different modalities on everyday life.

The rollout was completed in April 2016 in SARP and November 2016 in NARP. As of December 2016, 152 patients have been referred for group modality education, 119 of which have attended the introductory modality education. Congratulations to the entire Modality Education team!
