We have a number of long-time members leaving Councils in 2019-20 and we would like to acknowledge their hard work, dedication and passion. While we will miss them, we also know it's important for new voices to join the conversation and we look forward to building new partnerships, relationships and connections. We hope our departing members will continue to share their advice as members of the public and share their knowledge of the healthcare system.

This year, we added 23 new members to the Advisory Council family, and we also added a new Council. We were pleased to support and nurture the development of the Sexual Orientation Gender Identity & Expression (SOGIE) Provincial Advisory Council.

Members have made many contributions in their local areas, and you'll learn more about them in this report. Here are a few general examples from across the province over the past year:

- Evolution of the Wisdom Council: new Terms of Reference will guide the work of the Wisdom Council and includes creation of an Elder Circle which gives an enhanced role to Elders in helping to advise AHS on programs and services to best meet the needs of Indigenous people.
- **Connect Care**: a number of members have joined the patient advisory committees.
- Supporting more addiction and mental health services: many Councils held information sessions and highlighted the importance of services; their efforts helped support the development of Edmonton's new Access 24/7 Addiction and Mental Health Clinic and enhance awareness on services and access.
- **Expanding relationships**: connecting with the LGBTQ2S+ community through the new SOGIE PAC, meeting with municipal leaders, and holding meetings at Métis Settlements.
- Connecting with Albertans through <u>Community Conversations</u>: Health Advisory Councils partnered with AHS to host 12 events across the province, where Albertans shared their views about challenges and solutions to healthcare issues.
- **Highlighting top concerns**: based on feedback from their communities, all Councils advised us on local concerns. AHS tracks and responds to concerns at each Council meeting.
- Participation in Community Engagement Committee of the Board meetings: various Council Chairs joined the conversation and shared ideas.

Member satisfaction is important to us, and it was gratifying to learn through the Annual Satisfaction Survey that our members are feeling generally satisfied in their roles. They've also said there's a need for more clarity on their role, and we're listening. We have begun work on an overarching Health Advisory Council review to address some of the gaps, and to ensure all our members fully understand their role.

On behalf of the AHS Board of Directors, our leadership team, and our workforce, thank you for your passion and time. We look forward to continuing to work with you on improving healthcare for Albertans.

Message from the Chair, Cancer Provincial Advisory Council

The composition of the Provincial Advisory Council on Cancer (PACC) is unique among Alberta Health Services' Advisory Councils. PACC comprises a mixture of persons touched by cancer and persons selected for special professional or administrative expertise relevant to cancer.

The principal mechanisms by which PACC provides advice and comment to AHS, in fulfillment of its work plan, include:

- Providing advice to AHS leaders through discussion at PACC meetings following presentations on key program issues;
- Individual PACC members' participation by appointment or invitation to certain AHS committees or planning meetings (e.g. membership on the Core Committee and some working groups of the Cancer Strategic Clinical Network);
- Interacting with the Health Advisory Councils, the other Provincial Advisory Councils and the Wisdom Council through the Council of Chairs and the annual Fall Forum.

PACC's annual report illustrates the breadth of issues considered by PACC during 2018/19, as it interfaced with leadership of CancerControl Alberta, the Cancer Strategic Clinical Network and the cancer prevention and screening leadership of Population, Public and Indigenous Health.

Two very special activities deserve highlighting:

- During the December 2018 meeting, PACC hosted Sharing Our Stories, a full day session involving representatives of the Alberta First Nations Information Governance Centre, the Métis Nation of Alberta, the Métis Settlement General Council, the AHS Wisdom Council, and leaders and managers from CancerControl Alberta and AHS Population, Public and Indigenous Health. The purpose of the meeting was for all to gain a better understanding of the status and challenges of provision of cancer services to Indigenous persons and populations in Alberta, to underpin accelerated progress towards equity in service quality.
- During PACC's March 2019 meeting, PACC had a viewing of the film: Greg's Story: Falling through the Cracks, presented and discussed by Dave and Teri Price. This poignant experience heightened PACC's understanding and appreciation of AHS initiatives to improve the continuity of clinical services to cancer patients.

I would also like to thank Ms. Nancy Guebert, Ms. Brenda Hubley, Dr. Matthew Parliament, Dr. Huiming Yang, Ms. Barb O'Neill and Dr. Doug Stewart, for their invaluable contributions to our work. Very special thanks to Ms. Laura Lee Clarke and Ms. Selene Snell for their skillful and diligent administrative support of PACC's activities. Finally, the management and staff of AHS Community & External Relations have helped to ground PACC's work within the wider context of all Advisory Councils activities.

Our priorities

- Support the implementation of "Changing our Future: Alberta's Cancer Plan to 2030", through advice to AHS CancerControl Alberta to enhance cancer services for all Albertans.
- Represent the patient voice with community perspectives and thoughtful engagement and conversations that create shared understanding.
- Engage with Health Advisory Councils, Provincial Advisory Councils, Wisdom Council and the public to harness patient and community perspectives to enrich Cancer PACs deliberations and advice.
- Share lived experiences and perspectives with Alberta Health Services

In December 2018, a diverse group of participants met in Edmonton to attend a facilitated full day Indigenous Forum – "Sharing Our Stories".

The aim was to bring awareness and gain a better understanding of the status and challenges of provision of cancer services to Indigenous persons and populations in Alberta.

Cancer PAC members met with CancerControl Alberta, the Cancer Strategic Clinical Network (SCN) and the Alberta Cancer Foundation in June 2018 to assist in the development of a framework and plan for delivering Adolescent and Young Adult (AYA) Cancer Services in Alberta.
