### Key achievements of 2020-21

We had a very busy year creating awareness of the Council. It proved to be worthwhile as 114 community members attended our meetings and events this last year.

This year we partnered with AHS to host three community engagement events. In November, 48 community members attended two virtual training sessions on Psychological First Aid (PFA) for a Pandemic. Psychological First Aid addresses mental well-being, similar to how Standard First Aid addresses physical injury. These sessions helped participants gain tools focused on stress reduction, stress management, self-awareness, emotional self-regulation and emotional literacy.



Our third community engagement event was held in April where 38 community members attended a session on Indigenous Land Acknowledgements from AHS' Provincial Indigenous Wellness Core. Through this event we built awareness of the reconciliation process. Participants learned what a land acknowledgement is, what it means, and how to develop a land acknowledgement statement.



In March, we participated in a virtual COVID-19 Community Conversation for the North Zone. Medical Officer of Health Dr. Kristin Klein provided an update on the status of COVID-19 in Alberta and the North Zone, and AHS' response - including AHS' vaccination program. Dr. Klein addressed concerns and shared resources for members to share within their communities.



Susan Giesbrecht, Council Chair and Lindsay Davies, Vice Chair, attended a Council of Chairs meeting in April with the Honourable Tyler Shandro, Minister of Health. Minister Shandro provided an update and engaged in dialogue with the Chairs.

A look ahead

In the year ahead, Council will focus on connecting with the communities in our Zone as we plan for meetings and engagement events in 2021-22. We will host two public meetings and we encourage the public to attend and share insights on healthcare services in their community. This will also be an opportunity to hear from health experts and local stakeholders on topics of interest.

Council will co-host two community events in collaboration with AHS. Community stakeholders will be invited to participate and learn more about health initiatives across our Zone.

Plans for the coming year include:

- Increasing public attendance and participation at HAC meetings through connections made at community events, promotion, and invitations to local stakeholders.
- Supporting AHS addiction and mental health to promote programs and services.
- Increasing connections with local Indigenous communities through invitations to HAC meetings and community events hosted by the HAC; and through partnership, where opportunity allows.
- Continuing to build relationships with other AHS Advisory Councils by sharing information through member involvement at Council meetings and events.
- Recruitment to fill vacancies. Representation is needed from rural and Indigenous communities to ensure diverse perspectives of our Council area.

Our community health partners are essential, and we will continue to build relationships through our meetings and events. Key stakeholders include Rural Health Professions Action Plan (RhPAP), Primary Care Networks (PCN) in the Zone, and local hospital foundations/ auxiliaries. We appreciate the connection with municipal leaders, Family and Community Support Services (FCSS), and other local community groups.

Over the past year, Alberta's six North Zone Health Advisory Councils have been instrumental in helping us get critical COVID-19 information out to our communities and in informing our pandemic response. In addition, they have shifted to a virtual model and engaged hundreds of local Albertans through their community events. The HACs are deeply connected to their local areas and work closely with AHS North Zone leaders. We are grateful for their advice and collaboration. We look forward to continuing to partner with the True North, Wood Buffalo, Peace, Lesser Slave Lake, Lakeland Communities, and Tamarack Health Advisory Councils.
