Key achievements of 2019-20

The YEHAC has worked intentionally to contribute to building stronger relationships between the people in its communities and AHS. It has done so by having frank and open conversations about local health service delivery at its meetings with AHS and one another.

Council members attended the annual Advisory Council Fall Forum to hear a variety of presentations including learning about the Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity & Expression Provincial Advisory Council (SOGIE PAC), HeartMath and Connect Care. We also participated in various breakout session that focused on wellness. Fall Forum was a great opportunity to network with fellow Council members, AHS staff and members of the AHS Board of Directors.

Some of our members belong to committees outside of the HAC that complement the work of our Council, such as:

- Primary Care Networks (PCN)
- Rural Health Professions Action Plan (RhPAP)
- Lloydminster Region Health Foundation
- Tofield and Area Health Services Foundation
- Wainwright and District Community Health Foundation
- Seniors and Continuing Care Provincial Advisory Council
- Saskatchewan Community Health Advisory Committee

In January, we participated in a joint meeting between AHS leaders and representatives from the Saskatchewan Health Authority to review and plan strategic health priorities in the border town of Lloydminster. This meeting identified key operational priorities and operational logistics and was later deferred to the Joint Operations Committee.

Throughout the year we shared Top Concerns from within our communities with the AHS Board. This helped contribute to a broad understanding of health service delivery issues across the province. Concerns shared include: addiction (increasing opioid use) and mental health (stigma; suicide prevention); access to diagnostics services; navigation and integration of services; quality of service and bed availability in seniors and continuing care; wait times to see specialists and family physicians.

At one of our meetings, a community concern was raised about long-term care sites in Vegreville. AHS has made changes as a result of this feedback by conducting more spot checks and increasing its presence at the site, as well as checking in with staff and families to hear their thoughts on the improvements.

We were invited to present to the Community Engagement Committee of the Board last May where we outlined our successes, challenges and opportunities.

A look ahead

Council is looking forward to 2020-21. Implementation of the new direction of Health Advisory Councils (HAC 2.0) will begin in the fall, where community events will be embedded into our annual planning cycle. Events will be co-designed with AHS and will be a partnership with Zone leadership. Work is underway to determine the nature of these events.

Our meetings are focused on bringing community voices to the leaders of AHS. These voices are an essential part of our role and mandate. Council plans to continue work on the following:

- Increasing public attendance at our meetings so the information we learn from AHS can be shared more broadly;
- Recruiting members from the communities of Two Hills, Vermilion, Bashaw, Hardisty and Provost, to ensure more demographic representation. See page six for information on how to apply.

Throughout the year mental health was identified as an area of interest. To help inform local communities about available services and resources, we will theme our meetings for the coming year to focus on health and wellness. As well, we plan to build our relationship with Indigenous communities by inviting them to our meetings and attending local events hosted by Indigenous groups in the Central Zone.

It has been a pleasure getting to know the members of the YEHAC over the last year. As a new Chief Zone Officer in the Central Zone, I have come to truly appreciate the wisdom and diversity the Health Advisory Council members bring to discussions about Health Care in the Zone. The members' deep commitment to their communities has enriched our understanding of local priorities and has helped us to build deeper, stronger and more collaborative relationships in the communities within the zone.
